



- A metaphor compares two things without using the words "like" or "as."
- Gives the qualities of one thing to something that is quite different.
- (See next slide for example.)



 In 1997, Godwin published Mukiwa: A White Boy in Africa. A memoir about growing up in Southern Rhodesia in the 1960s and 1970s during the Rhodesian Bush War, it was described by the Boston Globe as "devastatingly brilliant" and "[o]ne of the best memoirs to come out of Africa."






